# PULMONARY AND AEROSPACE MEDICINE FAA CERTIFIED AVIATION MEDICAL EXAMINERS

#### **BasicMed Requirements**

#### **FAA Requirements**

- 1. Valid and current US driver's license.
- 2. At least one FAA medical certificate (any class) valid after July 14, 2006.
  - a. If  $\geq$ 40 at time of FAA exam, exam performed on, or after, July 15, 2004.
  - b. If <40 at time of FAA exam, exam performed on, or after, July 15, 2003.
- 3. Most recent FAA medical certificate was not suspended, revoked, or denied.
  - If you had a Special Issuance (SI) from the FAA, the most recent authorization was not withdrawn.
- 4. Completion of an online "Basic Medical Education Course" every 24 months.
- 5. Completion of a "Comprehensive Medical Examination Checklist (CMEC)" every 48 months.
  - a. One section completed by airman; one section completed by physician.
  - b. A completed copy is retained by the airman and must be available on request.

## Conditions requiring a Special Issuance (SI) by the FAA prior to applying for BasicMed

- 1. Mental health disorders
  - a. Personality disorders with repeated manifestations.
  - b. Psychosis.
  - c. Bipolar disorder.
  - d. Substance dependence within the past 2 years.
- 2. Neurological disorders
  - a. Seizure disorder (epilepsy).
  - b. Disturbance of consciousness without satisfactory medical explanation.
  - c. Transient loss of nervous system function without medical explanation.
  - d. Any condition that renders (or can reasonably be expected to render) the individual unable to safely perform the duties of Pilot in Command (PIC).
- 3. Cardiovascular conditions
  - a. Coronary artery disease (heart attack, bypass surgery, angioplasty, stent).
  - b. Cardiac valve replacement.
  - c. Heart transplant.

### Additional requirements (unique to Dayton Chest Medicine): Annual visit to this office

- 1. Review of medical problems.
- 2. Listing of current medications.
- 3. Review of information from other physicians (if applicable).
- 4. Brief medical examination.

Dr. Smith will <u>not</u> be acting as your personal physician. You will still need a family physician or internist to act as your primary care physician. Depending on your individual situation, your primary care physician may be required to coordinate the care of other specialists.

When a physician signs the CMEC, he/she is stating that the airman is fit to be PIC. To do this effectively and honestly, an annual visit is required to review your medical situation. This also allows Dr. Smith to answer medical questions that may arise between scheduled visits. Typically, the charge for this annual visit is \$200 with payment required at the time of service.
